ABOUT AFP EASTERN PA CHAPTER

The Eastern Pennsylvania Chapter of AFP was first chartered in the summer of 1986 at a luncheon meeting at DeSales University, attended by more than 75 people from Berks, Lehigh, Monroe, Montgomery, and Northampton Counties.

The headquarters office of the Association of Fundraising Professionals, known then as the National Association of Fund Raising Executives (NSFRE), had been notified of the luncheon and sent a representative to attend with information about forming a chapter. By the end of that meeting, 15 fundraisers in the region had signed the chapter incorporation papers, Dr. Lona Farr was elected president, and the Northeastern Pennsylvania Chapter was born.

Three of the original Northeastern Pennsylvania Chapter members – Dr. Lona Farr, then Vice President at Good Shepherd; Malcolm Miller, then Vice President at Cedar Crest College; and Ken Hollenbach of the PCU Foundation, were interested in establishing a new Eastern Pennsylvania Chapter. The three members scheduled a breakfast, which Lona hosted at Good Shepherd, and agreed to each bring at least one more person. More than 12 people attended. The group's instincts were good and the rest is history! Membership in the AFP Eastern Pennsylvania Chapter has grown from those original three members, to 12, to the more than 180 members we have today!

Gudging Process

Prior to the call for nominations and application submission, an independent panel of judges is named. Judges are identified and invited to serve based upon their familiarity with the community through their profession and personal involvement in community activities.

Upon agreeing to serve, judges are provided with a list of awards, award criteria and a list of recipients from previous years.

Once all nominations are received, judges are provided with a copy of each nomination for their independent review and ranking, reviewing nominations for awards based upon the criteria for each award.

Judges are given time for independent review of the awards and convene to review and vote, facilitated by a non-voting AFP board member. Judges' independent rankings are polled. In cases where there is a disparity, judges discuss their rankings, and after discussion, a vote is taken. No nominee advances until judges reach a consensus decision on the rankings, and ultimately, the winning nomination.

Prior to discussing independent rankings, judges reveal any potential conflicts of interest due to affiliations, relationships or proprietary knowledge of any of the applicants. When necessary, a judge may recuse him or herself from a vote.

In 2016, at the age of 3, Ben was diagnosed with a Wilms Tumor, a form of childhood kidney cancer. An afternoon of fun at a Fourth of July fair turned into years of hospital stays, chemotherapy, and radiation treatments.


Ben received surgery at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia to remove his kidney. He had many months of chemotherapy and radiation only to find out that just three months off treatment he had relapsed to the lung. Ben continued with surgery and more intensive therapies. This past May Ben celebrated a milestone of four years in remission, which he does not take for granted.

Ben's outlook has supported his mission of helping children affected by cancer. In the summers of 2021 and 2022 Ben hosted the #superheroesforbenny Lemonade Stand in Easton, PA. The stand helped fund 12,127 dollars in Wilms Tumor research and developments through the Alex's Lemonade Stand Foundation. He has also worked closely with the HEADstrong Foundation to support their mission of improving the lives of families affected by cancer through fundraising and events. HEADstrong supported Ben's family during his own fight. Ben continues to raise awareness within his school and community for childhood cancer. He aspires to bring smiles to children fighting cancer. This year he is expanding his support to local families by collecting toys to distribute to the child life department at Lehigh Valley Hospital.

Ben is now a fourth grade student at Forks Elementary and has dreams of becoming a doctor someday. He enjoys video games, building legos, flag football, and playing with his friends. Ben brings immeasurable joy to his parents and younger sister. He truly makes each day count.

Bradbury-Sullivan LGBT Community Center provides a vibrant, inclusive space in Pennsylvania's Lehigh Valley for all of the region's LGBTQ+ residents. Since opening in 2016, Bradbury-Sullivan Center has gained a statewide reputation for promoting LGBTQ+ health equity. They administer the Pennsylvania LGBTQ Health Needs Assessment, and the team collaborates with partners across the state to make this data actionable in addressing issues of health equity through program development, policymaking, and resource mobilization. Here in the Lehigh Valley, Bradbury-Sullivan Center delivers leading-edge LGBTQ+ health programs that expand access to care and address intra-community health disparities. Bradbury-Sullivan Center produces innovative and enriching LGBTQ+ communitybuilding programs. Their fourteen monthly community groups create safe and celebratory spaces for a wide range of identities including community members who identify as BIPOC, transgender, and neurodivergent. Cultural events at the Center seek to highlight LGBTQ+ experiences at every intersection of race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, and ability. And of course, Lehigh Valley Pride has brought people across all backgrounds and identities together in community for nearly 30 years. In 2022, the Center made new commitments to accessibility and racial justice in order to better serve all branches of the region's LGBTQ+ community. An accessibility committee made up of staff and community members is identifying areas for improvement with regards to facilities, program format, and more, working with executive leadership to achieve solutions. With support from local funders including Just Born and Lehigh Valley Community Foundation's CORE Fellowship. the team is reflecting on and investing in racial justice-focused approaches to community service. We are pleased to recognize the Bradbury-Sullivan Center team for their hard work. They embrace the rich diversity of LGBTQ+ community members in the Lehigh Valley. They are constantly striving to create physical and virtual spaces where the LGBTQ+ community finds safety, support, validation, equity, and an opportunity to be heard.

A Donor Bill of Rights

PHILANTHROPY is based on voluntary action for the common good. It is a tradition of giving and sharing that is primary to the quality of life. To assure that philanthropy merits the respect and trust of the general public, and that donors and prospective donors can have full confidence in the not-for-profit organizations and causes they are asked to support, we declare that all donors have these rights:

I.

To be informed of the organization's mission, of the way the organization intends to use donated resources, and of its capacity to use donations effectively for their intended purposes.

II.

To be informed of the identity of those serving on the organization's governing board, and to expect the board to exercise prudent judgement in its stewardship responsibilities.

III.

To have access to the organization's most recent financial statements.

IV.

To be assured their gifts will be used for the purposes for which they were given.

V.

To receive appropriate acknowledgement and recognition.

VI.

To be assured that information about their donations is handled with respect and with confidentiality to the extent provided by law.

VII.

To expect that all relationships with individuals representing organizations of interest to the donor will be professional in nature.

VIII.

To be informed whether those seeking donations are volunteers, employees of the organization or hired solicitors.

IX.

To have the opportunity for their names to be deleted from mailing lists that an organization may intend to share.

X.

To feel free to ask questions when making a donation and to receive prompt, truthful and forthright answers.


